

**Kenwick Neighborhood Association  
Meeting Minutes  
1-22-08**

**1. Welcome**

Kristin Ingwell Goode, Board President, called the meeting to order, distributed the agenda and explained how the association operates for the benefit of first time attendees.

**2. Speaker: Scott Mitchell, LFUCG Animal Control Officer**

Scott Mitchell provided the following overview of his job: LFUCG Animal Control Officers respond to calls from Fayette County related to loose, aggressive and injured animals. Calls from the public are prioritized based on the reported problem and responded to as soon as possible. However, with a staff of just six officers, responses can sometimes take some time.

What to do if you see a loose dog ? Call the Animal Control Office and provide as much information as you can. If the dog is still loose when the officers arrive, they will impound the dog. If the dog is not loose at that time, they will discuss the leash laws with the owner to ensure understanding of the laws.

What to do about barking? Animal Control will take complaints on barking dogs. Officers will notify the dog owner in person or by door tag after each of the first two complaints. The third complaint will result in a citation being issued on behalf of the complainant. Each time a complaint call is made, the caller must provide full name and contact information.

Animal Control can be reached at 255-9033, Ext. 1 or by calling LexCall 311. Officers are dispatched 8am-6pm daily for all calls. From 6-11pm officers will be dispatched for emergencies only and from 11pm-8am, officers will be dispatched in severe emergency only—police must already be on the scene to qualify.
